On my daily walks around my Sunset West neighborhood, I have noticed an increasing number of Little Free Libraries being placed in front yards by residents. This prompted me to investigate the origins of the Little Free Library movement. Little Free Library was founded in 2009 by Todd Bol and Rick Brooks in Wisconsin. They were inspired by Andrew Carnegie, who, in the early 20th century, established over 2500 free public libraries. Little Free Library is now a non-profit corporation based in Minnesota and has established over 150,000 Little Free Libraries in over 100 countries. The goals of Little Free Library are to be a catalyst for building community, inspiring readers, and expanding book access for all through a global network of volunteer-led Little Free Libraries. Through an honor system of "Take a book, Leave a book" these little libraries share 70 million books annually.

Those interested in establishing their own Little Free Library should visit the Little Free Library website, littlefreelibrary.org. If you decide to start your own Little Free Library, a great place to get books to start is the Friend's bookstore located in the Civic Center library.
