LIVERMORE READS TOGETHER

First developed by the Seattle Public Library in 1998, communitywide reading programs serve as a popular way to connect community members, promoting literacy and civic unity by encouraging residents to read and discuss the same book. The Livermore Public Library joined this movement in 2007, selecting Isabel Allende's *Zorro* for the first annual Livermore Reads Together series, and has been going strong ever since.

We fund all these programs well before the scheduled start dates so that Library Staff can order materials and book the best people to provide the best programs for our community (before other organizations try to book them!). We are privileged to work with the best organized, most creative and enthusiastic Library Staff on the planet to serve the Livermore community. The bookstore has recently received a donation of several paintings of authors. The paintings were done by the painter Isao Shimamura and donated by his daughter Susan Shimamura. She originally donated them to the library, but they did not have an appropriate location to display them and passed them on to the bookstore. Many of the volunteers in the Bookstore are happy to receive the art and delight in telling customers that the children's books are under Dr Seuss's picture. The painting subjects include Charles Darwin, Nelle Harper Lee, Elizabeth Barrett Browning, Henrik Ibsen, and Leo Tolstoy. We are working on deciding which of the paintings are the most appropriate and the best locations for them and will get the library to permanently attach them to the walls.

We have an abundance of children's items at the moment in the bookstore, and we are offering children's books, DVDs and CDs, as well as young adult books on sale. For the next few months these items will be buy one, get one free.

Each summer we have a general meeting where we vote on the year's officers. To this end, we will be collecting nominations for officers in the bookstore. There will be a box when you can put your ideas for the next year's officers. We will verify their willingness to run for office and present the candidates to the annual meeting's attendees. We will replace the nomination box with a voting box for the month.

Spare Parts: Four Undocumented Teenagers, One Ugly Robot, and the Battle for the American Dream by Joshua Davis.

The key elements of a good "underdogs succeed despite challenges" story is there: impoverished and misfit kids, underfunded high school, and inspiring science teachers encouraging their students to come up with low cost solutions to the challenges of an underwater robot competition. Even learning the social, language and technical skills to get to this competition are daunting. The accolades and scholarship offers after winning against all odds are then vastly complicated by each team member's family challenges and undocumented status. There are no "easy" solutions to the struggles experienced by the people in this story. This book is hard to read - the gap between many of our own experiences and opportunities with those in this story (the young men, their family members and teachers) is difficult to imagine or understand. And the life experience of each robotic team member results in unique paths for each after the competition. This story is important in helping the reader begin to understand the challenges of undocumented people living in our community, and throughout our country.

The Donation Journey




Patrons put their donated books into the big Donations bin on the south side of the library, or on the table outside out bookstore.



Bookstore volunteers select what they want to shelve and sell.

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Library pages place Donation Bin contents on a cart, librarians select those they want for the Main Collection, then the cart is taken to the bookstore.





Books not selected for shelving are boxed and taken to Sorting, in Tech Services.

There, Friends volunteers scan barcodes or type ISBNs (International Standard Book Number) into a database at ThriftBooks, our primary wholesaler.

A thriftbooks

Books going to ThriftBooks are boxed for shipping. When 20 boxes are ready for shipment to Thrift, they are shipped at no charge to the Friends. Some of the better books rejected by Thrift are marked for the "last chance sale" and returned to the bookstore for the special sale.




What happens to stuff that neither wholesaler wants? Books in bad condition are recycled, as are encyclopedias and proof/galley copies illegal to resell. VHS and cassette tapes are discarded-- no market anymore -- as is anything with a missing part.

So, keep on donating! You are supporting your fine Library, getting books and DVDs into new hands, and keeping a surprising amount of stuff out of the landfill.








ThriftBooks tells us to "Ship It" or "Don't Ship It," depending upon whether they think they can sell it for us.









Remainder go to secondary wholesaler Discover Books, who pays us by the pound. Discover picks up at the Library, again at no charge to Friends.

Student Robotics Fair

On Saturday, January 26th, Livermore Library kicked off the 2019 Livermore Reads Together (LRT) program with a Student Robotics Fair. The Friends of the Livermore Library sponsors the LRT program. This year's LRT book selection, Spare Parts, is about students winning an underwater robotics competition in Santa Barbara sponsored by the Marine Advanced Technology Education (MATE) Center in Monterey. The Student Robotics Fair started with presentations by representatives from both the MATE Center and the Monterey Bay Aquarium Research Institute (MBARI) discussing both the annual underwater robotics competition and the use of underwater robotics in scientific research.

The first presenter was Jill Zande, the associate director and competition coordinator for the MATE Center. She started her presentation showing a short clip from the 2015 Hollywood movie adaptation of the book Spare Parts. She then went on to provide an overview of the MATE Remotely Operated Vehicle (ROV) competition and its history. The MATE ROV competition is run in partnership with the Marine Technology Society's (MTS) ROV Committee. The competition requires each team to develop an ROV and use it to accomplish a set of underwater tasks. In addition, each team must prepare technical reports and presentations to market their ROV as a "product" to simulate a real-world engineering project.

The MATE ROV competition began in 2001 and has been run every year growing larger with each successive competition. The events described in Spare Parts occurred during the 2004 competition. Each year the competition is held in a different location with a different theme. In 2018, the competition was held in Washington state. Sixty-five teams from nineteen countries participated. The main competition was fed by 36 separate regional competitions that included K-12, community college and university students. The competition is divided into four levels (Scout/Navigator/Ranger/ Explorer) with the Scout level for beginners and the Explorer level for the advanced students. In 2019 the competition will take place between June 20th and 22nd in Kingsport, Tennessee with the theme of "Innovations for Inshore: Operations in Rivers, Lakes, and Dams."

The second presenter was Dr. George Matsumoto, a Senior Education & Research Specialist from MBARI in Moss Landing. Dr. Matsumoto gave an overview of the underwater robotics work of MBARI which operates two research vessels deploying large and sophisticated ROVs such as the 10,500-pound Doc Ricketts. His presentation featured numerous videos of how the instruments on the ROVs are used to sample and study different aspects of the marine environment both on the seabed and throughout the water column. He showed many examples of interesting sea life they have encountered in Monterey Bay.

After the presentations, the attendees moved to the library's Storytime Room where the students displayed their robotic projects. Schools which displayed their robots were:

Mare Island Technology Academy (MIT), Vallejo, CA Emma C. Smith Elementary, Livermore Chaboya Middle School, San Jose, CA Christensen Middle School, Livermore Boy Scouts (Robotics Merit Badge) Robot Garden, Livermore



LIBRARY SERVICES

Free Income Tax Help

Free income tax help is available every Thursday from **February 7th to April 11th.** Trained AARP volunteers will be able to answer questions and help prepare state and federal tax forms. Appointments are preferred but there is a very limited number of walk-in spots available on a first-come, first-served basis if time permits.

Appointments are 75 minutes long and are at 10 a.m., 11:15 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. Please call (925) 373-5505 to schedule an appointment.

To use this service, you must:

- Have been a full year CA resident during 2018 and have no out-of-state income
- Be willing to have the return e-filed
- If married, have your spouse sign the return during the appointment
- Have had no cancellation of debt in 2018 except personal credit card debt
- Be present when called

Please bring the following documents to your appointment:

- A copy of last year's tax return
- A W-2 from each employer
- All 1099 forms
- All forms indicating federal and state income tax paid
- Unemployment compensation statements
- Dependent care provider information
- Forms and receipts for itemizing deductions
- The cost of any stocks or bonds sold in 2018
- ID and Social Security cards for yourself and all dependents

Free Legal Help

Free legal help is available at the Civic Center Library and the Rincon Branch Library. An Alameda County Bar Association lawyer will provide a free 10-minute confidential consultation on a wide variety of issues: landlord-tenant disputes, probate matters, employment problems, and other general consumer issues. The consultation is to determine whether there is a legal problem and to provide guidance on how the legal problem might be solved and is not for in-depth legal analysis or advice. Please bring any papers or documents related to the legal issue.

Appointments can be made in advance. Patrons may also sign up for drop-in appointments at 5:30 p.m. on the day of the event to see if there are any no-shows.

The Lawyers in the Library Program is a countywide service coordinated by the Alameda County Law Library and staffed by volunteer attorneys. There is no specific income eligibility requirement to use this service.

Each of the three library branches has a black and white photocopier available for public use. Photocopies cost \$0.15 per page for black and white photocopies.

The Civic Center Library offers a scanner for public use, located in the Copy Room. Scanning to email or USB is free.
