## **Livermore Reads Together**

The New York Times bestselling book, *The Reason I Jump: The Inner Voice of a Thirteen-Year-Old Boy with Autism,* will be the featured book for the 16th Livermore Reads Together (LRT), the Library's annual community reading program sponsored by the Friends of the Livermore Public Library.

Written by Naoki Higashida, a remarkable thirteen-year-old boy with autism, *The Reason I Jump* is a one-of-a-kind memoir that demonstrates how the mind of a young boy with autism thinks, feels, perceives, and responds in ways few people can imagine. Using an alphabet grid to painstakingly construct words, sentences, and thoughts that he is unable to speak out loud, Higashida answers even the most delicate questions such as: "Why do people with autism talk so loudly and weirdly?" "Why do you line up your toy cars and blocks?" "Why don't you make eye contact when you're talking?" and "What's the reason you jump?" (Higashida's answer: "When I'm jumping, it's as if my feelings are going upward to the sky."). With disarming honesty and a generous heart, Higashida shares his unique point of view on not only autism but life itself. His insights — into the mystery of words, the wonders of laughter, and the elusiveness of memory — are so startling, so strange, and so powerful that readers will never look at the world the same way again.

It has been a tumultuous 22 months since the beginning of the pandemic and our world has changed in many ways. From the pandemic, to climate change, to social justice, and a focus on equity, diversity, and inclusion (EDI) efforts, our country has faced unprecedented challenges and obligations. During this time, the Livermore Public Library has sought to continue supporting the community's needs and to connect patrons with materials and services that provide support and add value to their lives. I have been proud of the Library's efforts, successes, and accomplishments since my arrival last June, and look forward to guiding and influencing our work in 2022 and beyond.

My first priority as the new Library Services Director was to ensure that all of the Library's programs and services are designed with EDI in mind. We have worked to expand our outreach and promote programs to all segments of our community. It is no longer enough to offer an open invitation; we must reach out to underserved populations, connect with people, uncover what services and programs would be best to address that communities needs, and actively seek to engage with them as part of our Library.

February is Black History Month and the Library is planning several programs to celebrate the heritage of African Americans. In addition to programs and events, we are planning to feature relevant collection displays throughout the Library.

The annual Livermore Reads Together event has taken place in February in years past. Going forward, to allow February's efforts to be focused on Black History Month, Livermore Reads Together will occur in the month of March. The feature title this year, The Reason I Jump: The Inner Voice of a Thirteen-Year-Old Boy with Autism, written by Naoki Higashida, has been described as a one-of-a-kind memoir that demonstrates how a young boy with autism thinks, feels, perceives, and responds in ways few people can imagine. In consideration of the rising prevalence of autism spectrum disorders (approximately 1 in 44 children), bringing awareness through this novel and the programs associated with it will enhance our community's understanding of developmental disabilities and lead to increased inclusion. Many of the planned programs are sponsored by the Friends of the Livermore Public Library, and we are grateful for their continued support.
